



USING THE +15 SKYWALK

Interactive pedestal maps located throughout the +15 let you look at the entire pathway system and zoom-in to a chosen area. You can also find individual buildings by address and the pedestal map will show you how to get there.

On the sidewalk, +15 signs direct you to the +15, whether that's through a building or up a nearby staircase. ▼



The illuminated signs at each bridge show the +15 Skywalk icon, which building you're heading towards, the direction you're travelling and a symbol.



▲ The fish represent the Bow River, which runs through our city north of the downtown on its way from the Bow Glacier to Hudson's Bay.



▲ The fort represents Fort Calgary, built by the North West Mounted Police in 1875 to force out whiskey traders. Fort Calgary is located on the east side of our downtown, where the Bow and Elbow Rivers meet.



▲ This 19th century Atlantic 4-4-2 steam locomotive, represents the Canadian Pacific Railway running along our downtown's southern edge on its way across the country.



▲ The mountain range represents our Canadian Rockies dominating the skyline to the west of our city.
